3. Reading. He also enjoyed learning about the English Puritans and the Great Reformers of Europe. He also took an interest in Theology and Church History.
4. The Brainerd family would spend time in family worship. David’s father led in family devotions. They sang hymns together.
5. Attending Church, worshiping the Lord, and listening to sermons.
6. He lost both his parents and had to live with different family members. David felt that he did not have a true home.

3. Pastor Mills at Ripton readily accepted David into his home and taught him theology and the practice of pastoral ministry.
4. Bible Meditation for Brainerd meant taking a small portion of Scripture and reading it over and over again and praying frequently over its content that God would apply the truths found therein to his own mind, heart, and soul.
5. Yes. He passed and was ready to step into the pulpit to deliver a sermon.
6. He emphasized the importance of fervent charity in his first sermon.

Chapter 1

1. She responded with a reminder to yield all to the will of God for His thoughts are thoughts of peace, and not of evil. Death with God is powerless. Christ is the resurrection and the life: he that believes in Him, though he were dead, yet shall live.
2. She replied that comforting the sick is no less a service to God than joining with the congregation.
3. They arrived in the year of our Lord 685.
4. She concluded that this circumstance was a pagan god Woden's revenge because his worship had been neglected. Her solution was for the Herzog Gozbert to appease the injured gods by sacrificing the blaspheming foreigners on the forsaken altars. Her method only kept them away for less than a year. Within a year, the Chawari came back with tenfold the number, burning and murdering with ruthless fury.
5. He raised his voice in the counsel and confronted the men to die as confessors witnessing for the Lord rather than be killed by the Chawari.
6. The Herzog asked the Abbot to pray for him. After this, Herzog Gozbert believed and was baptized after being instructed in the truth.
7. The Herzog died.

Chapter 2

1. 12
2. The Herzog tried to express his desire that the Abbot should be sent for to pray with him, but instead of sending for the Abbot, Geila sent pagan priests.
3. He asserted that the Herzog is a Christian, and while he lives, his will is paramount, and not another person's will. He also threw the pagan priest out of the room declaring that no matter how many goats and boars he kills as a sacrifice, he will not hinder the Herzog from departing in peace to his Lord and Master.
4. He called three Christians and three heathen freemen to his bedside and had them witness Gozbert testify of his son's reign as his successor and to have the men of God continue their holy work in peace, not hindering or troubling them.
5. Hedan accused Gsilhar of assuming lordship over him by hearing the Herzog's oath with the witnesses without permission. He proved his reign by cracking down upon the believers by not allowing worship to take place for a month. Some objected to this injunction that this is not God's will, some obeyed and worshipped the Lord in their cabins in silence. They also prayed for the new Herzog that the Lord will turn his heart and give him thoughts of peace towards them.
6. She responded that if you believe that Woden is non-existent, you cannot treat him as existent by identifying him as the devil. The devil is existent and present in this world, but the false god, Woden is an idol that is nothing.
7. The wives of the men of God should not be heathen girls (that is, not unbelievers). Their wives must be true, zealous, hum-

ble-minded, God-fearing, and faithful Christians.

Chapter 3

1. He confronted Hedan by questioning him if he truly believes that the false gods would admit Gozbert to Walhalla. He also boldly stated that these false gods will otherwise send him to Hell.
2. In order not to injure the heathenism in which they trusted, Pullig and Herzog affirmed the false tale by announcing to all attending the funeral that the Herzog "repented" and turned back to paganism. Hezzilo considered that nothing would be hurtful to the cause of his false religion than to have Christianity re-established, so he instructed Pullig to join him in this detestable proclamation of lies. Pillung declared that if whatever he said was a falsehood, he would let Woden crush his right hand which was raised towards him.
3. She dreamed of Gozbert lifting both hands towards the cross, Gsilhar praying an endless prayer, Haimerich leading the little band of Christians back to Wirtsburg, and finally, the Druidess Walda bursting out and exclaiming that Hel has received her husband, which was quite a nightmare for her.
4. Geila's description is of fierceness, a woman born into violence, wild, and having the character of a proud warrior. Bellaheld's description, back in chapter 2, is of humble-minded, God-fearing, and faithful Christian.
5. Hedan asked Bellaheld, amongst all maidens in the land, to be his wife, and in doing so, he would not further forbid the worship of the Lord.
6. This is a very serious request. Hedan would probably not take refusal lightly, and if refused, it might bring about persecution towards the church as Hedan attempted in the first place. At the same time, marrying a heathen Herzog is to be unequally yoked.
7. Bellaheld responded and refused his offer by choosing to stand firm in what the Scripture warns about being unequally yoked. Her response changed to accepting Herzog's offer after he threatened to persecute the church if she did not change her position on this matter.

Chapter 4

1. Hedan sent Geila to Hamelburg.
2. Hedan had Haimerich announce the continuing of worship freely with bell-ringing and Psalm-singing. His motivation came not from his father's dying wish, nor his heart, but rather, it came about from the wish of his future bride, Bellaheld.
3. She learned that the future wife of Hedan is a Christian, she realized the change in his perspective upon Christians, and worst of all for her, she realized that it would be impossible to wage a successful war against Christianity and to drive the Irish missionaries away.

4. She planned not to move to Hamelburg, but remain in Wirtzburg to make sure that her destructive plan to persecute the church would be carried out.
5. She considered the thorny path before her and prayed to God for strength to walk that path in obedience. She also prayed for wisdom when she encounters her mother-in-law and to honor her without compromising the firmness she possesses in her Christian faith.
6. He described humility to Bellaheld as the bloom on the fruit of every Christian virtue. He also instructed Bellaheld to humble herself before God, know her state in front of God, even as a wife of a Hergoz.
7. 1 Peter 3:1-2. He instructed Bellaheld to be subject to her husband, but never allow herself to be kept from prayer, maintain the meeting with the brethren in the house of God, and be a faithful champion for the Christian people.

Chapter 5

1. Haimerich, a Christian, was not afraid because the living God is his sure defense. Others might have a reason to fear the passing of Woden if there was such a deity but Haimerich knew that Woden was just an idol.

3. God can.
4. A beech tree fell upon Pulling's right hand, eventually requiring him to have it amputated.
5. It is not the gods, but the One God, who made heaven and earth, who showed His power upon Pulling because he perjured himself, bearing false witness against His Kingdom.
6. Yes. He confessed that he bore false witness from beginning to end, just as Hezzilo taught him to.
7. Hezzilo lost his right hand by the Herzog's command, and Geila was banished to the Hamelburg.

Chapter 6

1. He blessed them by praying to God for wisdom in ruling, and strength to confess and stand by the truth at all times. He also prayed a blessing upon Bellaheld that she would be a true and faithful wife, and that no man put asunder the relationship God has joined together.
2. The greatest treasure was that same Gospel book Gertude had read to Bellaheld's dying mother.
3. His hatred towards Christianity vanished under the loving treatment and discipleship given to him by the brethren.
4. She showed unvarying kindness to all her servants and practiced great forbearance with the attitudes of the heathen. She gathered around Christian woman-servants with her, read with them a portion of the Gospel, and prayed with them.
5. The heathen neighbors valued her kindness and rested greater

confidence in her, and some begged her to give them Christian instruction. Answers will vary, but some characteristics may be humble, kind, pure, gentle, patient, loving, and obedient.

6. Horsa, the Herzog of the Saxons had invaded the land, and many of the heathen nobles had joined him and waged war against those in Wirtzburg.
7. Bellaheld explained that the Christian's prayer is not a tool to force God to do our will, but it is a plea to do whatever is right according to His eyes. After Hedan remarked that he had done much good towards Bellaheld's God, Bellaheld responded by saying he may have done his duty for the Christian cenoby, but not to himself for his salvation.

Chapter 7

1. She returned with her attendants, all who were heathen, and a number of pagan priests with their wagons containing all the necessary items needful for pagan sacrifice.
2. In the morning, while Bellaheld read the Gospel with her fellow believers and united in prayer, the heathen servants would interfere with the believers' worship with their own singing, taunting, and distractions. Whenever the Christian servants ventured abroad, they were reviled and buffeted.
3. Gisilhar. It grieved him beyond measure to see Bellaheld in this situation, being married to a heathen Herzog and being tormented daily by the former Hergozin, that he came to interfere and teach Geila better. He also came to advise Bellaheld to depart from the marriage with Hedan.
4. She responded that she was Hedan's true wife, and she will keep her vow made before God. She has no intention to dishonor the name of Christ and leave the Christians vulnerable to persecution resulting from Hedan's act of vengeance.
5. His message was that Hedan's army rose victorious over the enemy.
6. She revealed to Geila that Gisilhar had been sighted at Hochheim. Geila concluded that there is some affair and some understanding between Gisilhar and Bellaheld.
7. The Herzog was dead.

Chapter 8

1. He was overtaken by the enemy who came from a direction where he least expected them. He was struck down by a blow from a club.
2. She wrongfully concluded that this was the revenge of the gods for not worshipping them and not giving them proper honor.
3. She demanded Regiswind that she twist her testimony and witness to accuse Bellaheld of doing the exact

opposite of what she did. She stated that the particular request Geila presented may be a work for a heathen, but not for a Christian as she is now.

4. She emphasized that it is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of the living God, but it is blessed to become His child and taste His love. God had enabled Regiswind to quicken her conscience and brought light into her darkened soul. She also let Geila know of Bellaheld's intercession for her that she would receive grace and forgiveness of sin.
5. She did not. Geila made sure that Regiswind would be included in one of the victims at the great sacrifice she intended to offer up to Woden in memory of her son's death.
6. She prayed and cried out to God for deliverance, strength to withstand, peace in sorrow, and submission to the Lord's will for her.
7. Pillung encouraged Bellaheld to flee at once. He was also chosen to be the victim who would be slaughtered the next day, and a more terrible fate awaited the Hergozin in the morning.

2. Hedan

6. Her name was formerly Geila, but after repenting of her sins, and turning away from idolatry, she embraced Christ and was converted and changed her name to Anna.
7. The pure light of the gospel stood firm amid centuries of the darkness of this world. The preaching of the old unchangeable Gospel truth of Christ, the only Savior of men, enabled the church to thrive and it was not quenched by the darkness of this world.
