



Errata - American Faith 2nd Edition

We regret that a printing error was missed on the 2nd edition of *American Faith*. On pages 183-184, there is a section of text missing. The missing text to the partial paragraph is below in bold:

First, the colonies were governed by their own elected civil magistrates. They understood the biblical doctrine of interposition defended by John Calvin and Samuel Rutherford, in which lower magistrates are responsible for defending the liberties of the people when those liberties are threatened by a higher magistrate. This doctrine would teach that all are subject to God’s law and the laws of the land, including the higher magistrate. When any magistrate rejects the laws, that government has become revolutionary and unlawful, and lower magistrates would then have the duty to resist that tyranny and restore lawful government. The British government was deemed guilty of such tyranny by the colonials. By its parliamentary actions such as taxing without representation, the British government had acted in violation of the constitutional rights of British citizens as guaranteed by constitutional documents such as the Magna Carta and the colonial charters. The colonial magistrates therefore felt justified in resisting the tyranny, and going to war for liberty and independence.
