Introduction

This 36-week course is designed as a second-grade English curriculum, helping your child to develop skills in spelling, grammar, and writing. Through engaging activities like coloring, reading, and writing, your child will learn essential language concepts, including spelling, sentence structure, and grammar.

By the end of the course, your child will have a knowledge of common grammar principles and be prepared to move on to a third-grade English curriculum. Lessons incorporate Scripture as well as commonly used short words, teaching foundational skills through a Biblical worldview.

This program includes 108 lessons, each requiring about 15–20 minutes to complete. We have structured this book in three lessons per week with parental involvement. Children who prefer a quicker pace can complete it faster. This steady, consistent approach ensures grammar concepts are understood and retained, without overwhelming the student.

The master word list at the back of the book can be used by the parent/teacher to read the words aloud to the student to complete the review lessons.

Note: Word search activities are optional, and are meant to be fun and engaging activities for the student. However, they may be omitted if the parent/teacher prefers.
